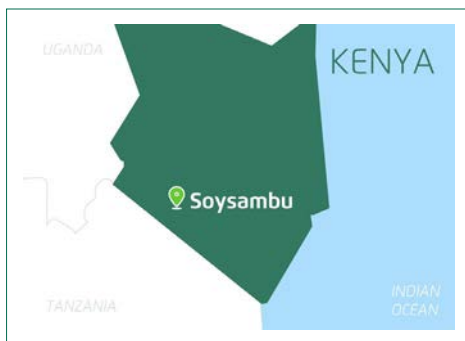

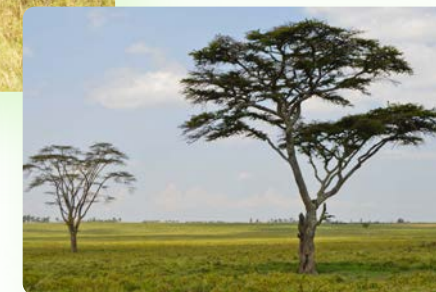

Overview

School students always enjoy visiting the wonderful country of Kenya, where they can work directly with some of the world's most incredible wildlife. Many of these animals are endangered and need the protection of volunteers. Students will have to be flexible to adapt to the Kenyan way of life and will develop communication skills as they work closely with local people. Caring for animals requires initiative, time management, and leadership skills, as volunteers plan ways to have a meaningful impact during their time in the country. They'll also help to build facilities to keep the conservancy running smoothly, improving the lives of locals who live there.



Day 1

Sunday

Arrival & Induction



Arrival

Volunteers board their plane with anticipation, knowing that they're heading into an exciting new world. They touch down in Nairobi, Kenya's lively capital. After passing through border control, they're greeted by a member of staff wearing a Projects Abroad t-shirt. Volunteers are taken to a shuttle bus, which will carry them to the Soysambu Conservancy in around three hours.

The First Day

Living in a conservancy is a different experience from staying in a town or city. Volunteers are given an induction to help them settle in. They're shown around the area, giving them a sense of the amenities that are available. During this time, they can pick up a local sim card and get some cash for the coming days. There is also a cultural awareness course to help volunteers bond with local people.



Days 2

Monday

Introduction to the Project

Planning for the Week

The first morning is spent planning for the week ahead. Students from different schools collaborate with local conservation experts to decide what the priorities are for the coming days. With the expert guidance from our staff, students cultivate their time management skills by creating a schedule for the week, along with a list of goals they want to achieve.



Spotting Animals

Students spot different animal species and learn about the environmental challenges to their existence. With the help of local experts, students use their critical thinking skills and knowledge to come up with realistic solutions. Already, they feel the excitement for the chance to help African wildlife.

Evening Fun

After a busy first day, students have time to relax, meet local people, and enjoy a lesson in East African dance. With joy and laughter, they move to the enchanting drum beat. It's during this time that students develop their social skills, communication, confidence, and cultural understanding. As night falls across the conservancy, students drift to sleep to the wild soundtrack of nocturnal creatures.

Days 3-5

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday

Conservation Work

The main role of volunteers throughout the week is to maintain the conservancy for the benefit of its inhabitants. The week is filled with activities that allow students to improve or develop a range of skills. Students get involved in maintaining waterholes, removing alien plants, collecting data by observing wildlife, monitoring camera trap footage, surveying giraffes, tracking lions, and mapping GPS signals. They strengthen their teamwork skills and enjoy the confidence that comes with getting their hands dirty, completing both manual and cognitive tasks.



Cultural Events

Evenings are spent building up the communication, collaboration, and social skills of students. Volunteers engage in various cultural activities, including a basic Swahili lesson and local cooking lessons. This is a chance for students to form valuable friendships.

Day 6

Friday

National Park Visits



Fun at the Lake

After completing work on Friday morning, the group is taken to explore beyond the Soysambu Conservancy. They head to nearby Lake Nakuru and marvel at its serene, shimmering beauty. For an even more magical experience, local staff take the group onwards to Lake Victoria, Africa's largest lake by area. Here, volunteers spot flamingos and learn about the special place that freshwater has in the hearts of the people and animals of Africa.



One Last Night

There's one last chance for the group to bond with each other and the local people. They enjoy their final delicious Kenyan dinner and go to bed bursting with pride for the work they've completed.

Day 7

It's been an unforgettable week for all involved and now it's time to say goodbye. Volunteers pack their bags and thank the local staff for the experience. During the three-hour drive back to the airport, volunteers have a chance to read back through their reflective diaries. Having kept track of all they've achieved, it's easy to see the amazing impact they've had. The world's greatest animals remain safe, the community-run conservancy remains open, and local people have what they need to thrive.

The flight home is a chance to reflect on the week with pride. Beyond the good work students have done for wildlife in Kenya, they've also built skills and gained confidence in their abilities. We wish them the best of luck for the future and hope this trip inspires them to do great things!

Wildlife

From the chaos of inner-city Nairobi to the sweeping tranquillity of its national parks, Kenya has a diverse and wonderful culture. There's no better place on the planet to see the world's most amazing animals. A proud and forward-looking democracy, Kenya is in touch with its ancient origins. Visitors to the country have an opportunity to learn about the Maasai people who live there.



Culture

Kenya is an incredibly diverse country, home to over 120 tribes. Each one has its own customs and traditions. On our Conservation Projects, volunteers interact with the Maasai people, who are well-known for their bright dress and distinctive jumping dances. Bonding in spite of cultural differences requires developing strong awareness and communication skills.



Food

Food is important in Kenyan culture and visitors will be warmly welcomed with some local cuisine. The national dish is nyama choma, a succulent and flavoursome grilled goat meat. A staple of the national diet is ugali, which is made of ground white corn. Historical ties to India mean visitors can also find exceptional Indian food in Kenya, including biryani and pilau.



Community

Community is at the heart of Kenyan life - a fact that visitors to the country quickly find out. Traditional dress is a way of signalling which community you belong to. Religion is an important part of modern community life, with more than 85% of the population identifying as Christian and a further 11% following Islam. Doing community work on a project is a great way to explore these cultures and help them continue to thrive.

Students will be expected to plan and lead lessons, building their management and leadership skills. They'll also get involved with completing renovation work. Nepal's culture is fascinating and unique. Students will need to be flexible, adaptable, and creative to settle in and make the most of this experience. Beyond the project itself, students can look forward to exploring the special city of Kathmandu and the stunning countryside that surrounds it.



Day 1

Arrival & Induction

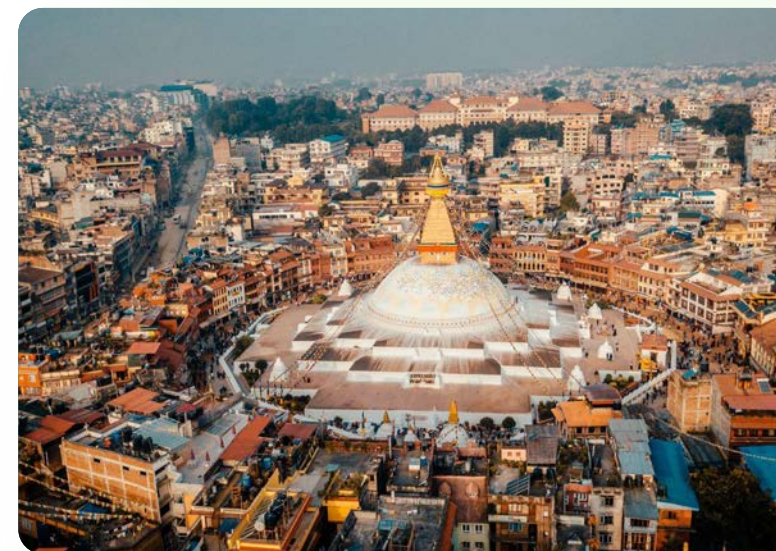


Arrival

The volunteer group boards a plane to Kathmandu, undoubtedly bursting with excitement for the week ahead. As the plane speeds towards the airport, students marvel at the mountains as they whizz past the windows. With over a million people, the noise and energy of Kathmandu will be immediately apparent. But set in a valley surrounded by the Himalayas, it's also a city of peace and tranquillity. Volunteers pass through customs and look for the Projects Abroad staff member who transports them to the accommodation.

Induction Day

After settling into the accommodation, students are given an induction to the city. During this time, volunteers can exchange or withdraw cash as well as get a local sim card if needed. They're given cultural awareness training and told the plans for the week.

Childcare & Community Work

Teaching Time

Teaching young children is a chance for volunteers to learn and develop themselves. Collaborating together, students create a daily schedule that's fun and engaging. This is the bulk of the week's work - a chance to build meaningful connections with children from a different country.



Renovation Work

Outside of lesson time, students are involved in improving classrooms. This means painting the walls with bright & colourful educational murals. It may also include building desks or playground equipment so that children are able to get the most out of their education.

Leisure Time

Non-project activities revolve around building cultural awareness, whether through dancing, yoga, or Nepali language lessons. Beyond this, volunteers can relax with quiz nights and scavenger hunts, designed to engage their critical thinking.

Discover Kathmandu

There's no doubt that Kathmandu is a colourful and unique city. Projects Abroad staff escort the group to some of the most famous tourist sights, including the Boudhanath Stupa and other enchanting temples.

Planning Ahead

The work begins now as students come together to plan the week ahead. In groups, they come up with creative lesson plans to engage young children. During this time, students can also think of creative ideas for the much-needed renovation work in the school. Nepal experienced an earthquake in 2015, meaning that many classrooms are newly rebuilt and still need some work.

Evening Fun

Monday evening is a chance to interact with the community and build social skills. Students join in with cooking lessons. This creates more than just a delicious dinner, but also an insight into the Nepali way of life. Throughout the week, these leisure activities help students gain cultural awareness, build relationships that cross borders, and nurture skills that will help them find employment in the modern world.

Day 6

Friday

Sightseeing in the City & Beyond



Explore Kathmandu

Students may have fallen in love with their project work, but it's also important to explore the community more widely. Local guides take students on a tour of the city, visiting incredible historic and spiritual sites like Darbar Square and the Garden of Dreams. There is also time to visit the foothills of the Himalayas that surround Kathmandu. Here, students experience a scenic hike, giving them a chance to breathe and reflect on their time in Nepal.



One Last Night

Returning home, it's time for a small celebration. This is the last time volunteers will see many of the people they've met including locals and fellow students. They enjoy one final meal at a traditional restaurant before heading to bed.

Day 7

Saturday

Leave Nepal

Goodbye and Good Luck!

A trip to Nepal is one that volunteers will never forget. They pack their bags with a sense of pride, knowing that they've left a positive impact on local children living in Kathmandu. They've also developed their own skills. They return home feeling more confident and better equipped for adult life. Students enjoy the continued support of the Projects Abroad staff, right until they safely arrive back at the airport to board their plane back home.



Final Thoughts

The trip may be over, but the journey doesn't end here. In their reflective journals, volunteers have a clear record of all they've achieved. Students are better prepared for the challenges that lie ahead. Now, it's time to continue building on the skills picked up in Nepal.

Our Nepal Childcare & Community Project is aimed at helping students build their employability. Students will be given the chance to develop the **twelve 21st Century skills**:



- 01 **Critical Thinking** - Identifying problem areas in the childcare system and devising solutions
- 02 **Creativity** - Painting murals to make classrooms more pleasant.
- 03 **Collaboration** - Working with school teachers and other volunteers.
- 04 **Communication** - Forming meaningful relationships with people who speak different languages.
- 05 **Information Literacy** - Staying informed on the local culture and education system.
- 06 **Media Literacy** - Reading Nepali media to get a sense of how this different culture views the world.
- 07 **Technology Literacy** - Using the internet to research the destination and local customs
- 08 **Flexibility** - Adapting to the Nepal way of life.
- 09 **Leadership** - Planning lessons and being a leader to the local children.
- 10 **Initiative** - Responding to the reactions of children and adapting lesson plans accordingly.
- 11 **Productivity** - Using a limited time period to make the biggest impact on local children
- 12 **Social skills** - Bonding with fellow volunteers, children, and local staff members.

Nepal Fact Sheet



Wildlife

Beyond the still-unconfirmed yeti, Nepal is home to some amazing animals. There are one-horned rhinos, Bengal tigers, snow leopards, and red pandas. Many of these are endangered, but the country has taken strong action to prevent hunting. Cows, considered sacred, are already protected from slaughter and this privilege has been widened to include more animals.



Culture

Nepal's diverse culture stems from both tribal and religious traditions. There are at least 125 different ethnic groups and castes. Over 80% of the country follows Hinduism, meaning they're likely to observe certain traditions, including vegetarianism and meditation. Visitors will also encounter Buddhism and the customs that come with this way of life.



Food

The food in Nepal will have similarities to other South Asian countries but has its own distinct identity. Visitors should try gundruk, a fermented leafy green vegetable. It's hard to find beef in Nepal, but meat-eaters can enjoy yak, goat, and sheep. The vegetarian options are bursting with flavour, including dishes like potato curry and dumplings, served with rice.



Community

Nepal's ancient society used a caste system, which divided people by ethnic grouping. This no longer officially exists, but its effects remain in today's society. Local people identify strongly with their religion, which often commits them to be peace-driven, hospitable, and community-oriented. Visitors will be welcomed into local communities, where group flourishing is valued above individualism.

Additional Information

Food

During their stay, students will be provided with three meals a day. Through food, students can learn more about the local culture and enjoy a variety of traditional meals such as Dal Bhat in Nepal or Ugali in Kenya. We can cater for various dietary requirements and you'll be able to discuss this with our pre-departure team before the trip starts.

Accommodation

Accommodation is included in the overall project cost and differs between location:

- ▶ Nepal - hotel/guesthouse
- ▶ Kenya - shared dormitories

We will always try to have students share a room with at least one volunteer or intern of the same sex and approximate age. Rooms will be modest, but comfortable, clean, and safe. Accommodation is included in the overall project cost and differs between location:

Travel Arrangements

While the cost of the trip doesn't cover flights or visas, our specialists will be on hand to advise you and walk you through the process. We'll send through information on applying for a visa (where required) and help complete any paperwork.

Flights

Students will be accompanied by a Projects Abroad staff member on their flight. After the application deadline, once all applications have been received, Projects Abroad will be in touch to help make all of the necessary arrangements and book flights.

Supervision
